Knowledge: Law making; the European Union, The legal system: the civil courts, The legal system; Legal personnel, The legal system; The Judiciary, The legal system; Access to justice and funding. Understanding: Students will understand the role of the European Union, the impact of the laws it creates on the UK and how those laws are created. They will develop an understanding of the different legal roles within society, such as solicitors, barristers and legal executives, they will understand what these jobs entail as well as how to qualify. They will understand the different levels of Judge within the courts and how to qualify to each position. Students will understand how a civil case can be dealt with both in court and through alternative dispute resolution. They will understand how to begin a civil claim and the steps that should be followed. Skills: Students will gain skills in research, understanding and learning subject specific terminology, the ability to evaluation legal systems and to summarise information into key points. They will develop career skills; students understand the requirements to become a legal professional. Transfers to real world application. Students will develop exam practice skills. Criminal law; the elements of a crime, actus reus and mens rea, no fault and strict liability offences.	Knowledge: Rules of a crime, Actus reus, Mens rea; intention, subjective recklessness, negligence, transferred malice, coincidence of actus reus and mens rea. No fault and strict liability; concept of strict liability, interpretation by the courts, justification for strict liability offences, arguments against strict liability offences. Understanding: Students will have an understanding of the necessary elements of a crime. They will understand the different levels of mens rea, be able to define them with case authority and distinguish which form is applicable in a scenario. Students will understand what a nonfault/strict liability offence is, they will be able to give examples and evaluate the need for these types of offence. Skills: Exam practice, students will begin to develop the application/scenario-based exam question skills, utilising the ILAC structure. Evaluative skills. Ability to break down the law and determine whether an offence is one of strict liability.	Students working independently to learn the subject matter covered. Students being able to explain the law. Criminal law: Non-fatal offences.

Civil law: the rules of Tort law, principles of liability, liability in negligence Knowledge:

Non-fatal offences against the person; s.39, s.47, s.18, s.20.

The rules of tort law; principles of liability and fault, negligence and remedies. Liability in negligence: Personal injury and damage to property: Duty of care, breach of duty, damage and res ipsa loquitor.

Understanding:

Students will develop an understanding of the different types of non-fatal offences. They will be able to define the offences, establish the mens rea and actus reus and support their definitions with case authority. Students will understand the elements of a negligence claim and be able to explain whether a duty of care has been breached. They w

Skills:

Exam practice and exam question skills. Application questions, preparation for extended questions in final exams. Develop ability to identify and apply appropriate law which is relevant to the demands of the exam question. Students will sit a mock exam; this will be there first full paper.

Students being able to explain the law.

An ability to evaluate legal practices.

Students will be able to reflect on their work produced and actively engage with the feedback.

What are we learning?							



A2 Tort law; nuisance and the escape of dangerous things, vicarious liability, defences and remedies.

Knowledge:

Nuisance and the escape of dangerous things; private nuisance claims, defences, Rylands v Fletcher, defences. Vicarious liability; testing employment status, acting in the course of employment. Students must know what sanctions and remedies exist in this area of English law. Remedy knowledge of compensatory damages; pecuniary and nonpecuniary, special and general. Discuss high profile cases which the students are familiar with.

Understanding:

Students will understand the law covering claims over nuisance and the escape of dangerous things, they will be able to apply the correct law and case authority. Students will understand the different elements of a claim under vicarious liability, the tests that must be satisfied for a successful claim and the case law that supports their application.

Skills:

Students will be able to define the law and apply it to scenario questions using the ILAC structure. Exam practice and exam question skills. Application questions, preparation for 30mark questions in final exams. Revision skills to be able to condense case law and legal points into manageable chunks.

Students working independently to learn the subject matter covered.

Students being able to explain the law.

An ability to evaluate legal practices.

Students will be able to reflect on their work produced and actively engage with the feedback.

Students will utilise the ILAC structure to apply the law to a scenario exam question.
