

Why higher education (HE)?



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HE study options

- Bachelor's or undergraduate degree: a three to four-year course which can also be available as a part-time option, allowing you to study and work.
- Foundation degree: flexible vocational qualification, combining both academic study and workplace learning. It usually takes two years to complete.
- Certificate of Higher Education (CertHE) and Diploma of Higher Education (DipHE): first and second year of a degree course.
- Higher National Certificate (HNC) and Higher National Diploma (HND): HNC is a oneyear work-related course, and the HND is a two-year work-related course.





Types of courses available

- Single: study one subject.
- Joint honours degree: divide your time 50:50 between two subjects.
- Modular courses: build a personalised course by choosing modules you're interested in.
- Sandwich courses: courses with one year in industry or a year abroad.
- Foundation year: if you don't have the right qualifications, some universities and colleges offer this to help students prepare for and enter higher education.

Choosing the right university for you

- **Style** from the traditional, with a focus on subject-based courses and research, to modern universities, with a greater focus on vocational courses.
- Location some are based in large cities, others in smaller towns. This can have a major influence on the environment and lifestyle on offer.
- Size larger universities can have more than 20,000 students, whereas some of the smallest have only a few thousand.
- **Culture and facilities** influenced by a range of factors, including the diversity of students who attend.
- What graduates do all universities collect destination statistics. It can be interesting to find out the types of jobs or further study students go on to.
- Tuition fees can vary between course providers. Check if there are any scholarships or bursaries available.
- Living costs accommodation, transport, and food can vary enormously.





Choosing the right course for you

- What does the course cover?
- Courses with the same title may be very different.
- Look carefully at the core course content, and the range of optional studies/modules available.
- Which modules are the most interesting and relevant to your career aspirations?
- See if the course or university/college offers any internship, placement, or study abroad opportunities.
- How is the course taught structured teaching, or more independent research? How many lectures are there, and how much group work will be done in seminars?
- How is the course assessed?
- Will you meet the entry criteria match your aspirations to your abilities

Making a UCAS applicatio

- Personal details
- Choices make up to five
- Education
- Employment
- Personal statement
- Reference



Decision-making

After receiving your application, a university or college will make one of three decisions:

- unconditional offer
- conditional offer
- unsuccessful

Or, they can offer a place on an alternative course.

Universities and colleges can also:

- request an interview
- ask to see your portfolio
- ask you to take an admissions test get practising now!





Tracking applications

Track allows applicants to:

- follow the progress of your application 24/7
- see your choices and personal information
- view your offers
- reply to offers online don't do this with discussing without your tutor

You may have up to five offers but you have to pick two:

- firm your first choice
- **insurance** –in case you miss the grades for your first choice you also pick an insurance choice which should require lower grades
- Unconditional if you have an unconditional you will only get one choice – assuming you choose that offer!









Extra (25 Feb – 4 Jul)

- Used all five choices and had no offers.
- Add Extra choices for consideration one at a time in Track.

Clearing (5 Jul – 19 Oct)

- Apply after 30 June, receive no offers, decline all offers, not met conditions.
- Find vacancies from July, and add one choice in Track.

Adjustment (up to five days in Aug)

- Placed with firm choice, and did better than expected.
- Register in Track, then find another university or college. The new university or college adjusts the record.









Signing up for UCAS 2021

- In Internet Explorer go to <u>www.UCAS.com</u>
- Click Sign in (top right)
- Undergraduate / Apply for 2021 / Register on the new screen
- Title and gender
- Name and DOB
- UK (? mostly)
- Address
- Phone numbers and <u>BSF email address</u>
- Tick which boxes you fancy but make sure to tick get stuff by email
- Add a password. Save it MAKE A NOTE OF IT IN YOUR PHONE
- Security questions put in phone / next
- MAKE A OF NOTE USERNAME THERE IS NO WAY TO RECOVER IT IF YOU
 FORGET IT MAKE A NOTE OF IT IN YOUR PHONE





- Now log in
- Tick 'Through school or college'
- Buzzword is BSF2021
- Click yes to NHS & BSF
- Select your tutor group
- Make a note of your personal ID in your phone
- Make sure you opt into Track or I won't be able to see you offers and help you later on
- Verify your email by following instructions.
- Now you can start filling in all your personal details / exams etc
 - Fee code is 02
 - Do not put Welsh
 - You will need to put in your current A levels with grades as pending; Mr Bridgwater will put in predicted grades
